Management Discussion and Analysis

Overview of the Economy and Banking Industry

Thai Economy in the Third Quarter of 2025

The Thai economy in the third quarter of 2025 slowed down from the previous quarter, driven by weaker private consumption and investment, along with a decline in foreign tourist revenue. Government budget disbursement also decreased, particularly in public investment. However, exports of electronic goods increased, in line with growing global demand for technology-related products. Meanwhile, several export items to the U.S. showed early signs of a slowdown due to reciprocal tariffs, although the overall impact on exports remained relatively modest. The service sector, which is a key driver of the economy, continues to face pressure from lower-than-expected tourist numbers, especially due to the ongoing decline in Chinese tourists. This has resulted in limited support for domestic service activities and consumption.

Headline inflation stood at -0.74 percent, down from -0.35 percent in the previous quarter and below the lower bound of the Bank of Thailand's target range of 1.00 percent, mainly due to falling prices of fresh food. Core inflation also declined to 0.77 percent from 1.04 percent. The average exchange rate was 32.30 THB/USD, an appreciation from 33.10 and 34.80 THB/USD in the previous quarter and the same period last year, respectively.

The Monetary Policy Committee has gradually reduced the policy interest rate since the beginning of the year, from 2.25 percent to 1.50 percent as of the end of September 2025, assessing that the Thai economy is expected to continue expanding, albeit at a pace below its potential due to both cyclical and structural pressures. Headline inflation is expected to remain below the target range for a period of time, primarily due to supply-side factors, while overall financial conditions remain tight, particularly for SME. Therefore, the committee viewed that it is appropriate to maintain an accommodative monetary policy stance to support the continued recovery of the economy. Thailand's economy is projected to grow by 2.2 percent in 2025, with growth momentum expected to moderate in the second half of the year due to the impact of U.S. import tariff policies and a slower-than-expected recovery in the tourism sector. In response, the new government has introduced short-term stimulus measures such as "Half-Half Plus" and "Tiew Dee Mee Kuen" as well as cost-of-living relief initiatives to support private consumption during the final two months of the year. In addition, Thailand continues to attract interest from foreign investors. According to the Board of Investment, 1,947 foreign direct investment projects applied for investment promotion during the first nine months of 2025, representing an increase of 38 percent, with total investment value reaching Baht 985,337 million, up 82 percent. This was driven by hyperscale data center investments, aligning with the government's policy to position Thailand as a regional technology hub and promote high-potential target industries.

Thai Banking Industry

At the end of the third quarter of 2025, loans and deposits in the Thai commercial banking system declined. However, deposits decreased at a slower rate than loans, leading to a lower loan to deposit ratio. Meanwhile, the ratio of non-performing loan (NPL) to total loans increased from the end of last year.



The Bank of Thailand's Credit Conditions Report indicated that corporate loan demand increased in the third quarter of 2025, primarily for project financing and refinancing. In contrast, SME loan demand declined due to reduced needs for working capital and inventory accumulation. Overall household loan demand remained stable, except for auto hire-purchase loans, which contracted due to low consumer confidence. In the fourth quarter of 2025, financial institutions anticipate that corporate loan demand will continue to increase for fixed asset investment and refinancing. SME loan demand is also expected to increase, driven by working capital needs. Overall consumer loan demand is showing signs of an upward trend, particularly in auto hire-purchase loans supported by promotional campaigns, while demand for other loan categories appears to be relatively stable.

Commercial banks place importance on providing assistance to all customer groups while supporting government policies for transitioning towards the sustainable growth of the Thai economy. This includes promoting responsible lending practices, encouraging good financial discipline, and offering assistance to vulnerable borrowers through the "You Fight, We Help" program as well as supporting those affected by flooding and the situation along the Thai-Cambodian border. In addition, commercial banks focus on fostering a risk culture within the organization, aligned with the Bank of Thailand's policy. In terms of technology, commercial banks have continued to enhance their capabilities by leveraging technology and data to develop innovative financial products and services that meet customer needs and prepare for future competition. This includes ongoing development of cybersecurity infrastructure, security measures for financial services and risk management frameworks for artificial intelligence, with the aim of fostering customers' trust and confidence.

Commercial banks continued to place greater emphasis on liquidity management with a focus on restructuring deposits appropriately, managing costs and maintaining their liquidity in line with Bank of Thailand's regulations, as well as focusing on asset quality and prudent risk management. The commercial banking system retains high levels of capital and has regularly increased loan loss reserves which will enable it to support credit demand and manage economic volatility going forward.

Bangkok Bank and its subsidiaries reported a net profit for the nine months of 2025 of Baht 38,247 million, an increase of 9.9 percent compared to the same period last year, driven by effective asset management and a diversified revenue base amid multifaceted economic challenges. Net interest income amounted to Baht 94,364 million, with a net interest margin of 2.81 percent, in line with interest rate trends. Non-interest income increased due to gains on financial instruments measured at Fair Value Through Profit or Loss (FVTPL), and gains on investments. Meanwhile, net fees and service income slightly declined from transaction service and mutual fund service. The Bank has continuously improved its operational efficiency, while placing emphasis on appropriate cost management. As a result, the cost-to-income ratio declined to 44.7 percent. Moreover, with its continued prudent approach, the Bank set aside expected credit losses for the third quarter of 2025 at a lower level than the previous quarter, leading to expected credit losses for the nine months of 2025 amounting to Baht 29,549 million.

At the end of September 2025, the Bank's loans amounted to Baht 2,606,661 million, a decrease of 3.2 percent from the end of last year. Meanwhile loans to large corporate customers continued to grow. The non-performing loan to total loans ratio was at a manageable level of 3.3 percent. Under the Bank's continuous prudent management approach, the ratio of the allowance for expected credit losses to non-performing loan remained strong at 294.2 percent.

As of September 30, 2025, the Bank's deposits amounted to Baht 3,174,287 million, a similar level to the end of last year, with the loan to deposit ratio of 82.1 percent. The total capital adequacy ratio, Tier 1 capital adequacy ratio, and Common Equity Tier 1 capital adequacy ratio of the Bank and its subsidiaries stood at 22.60 percent, 18.02 percent and 18.01 percent, respectively, comfortably above the Bank of Thailand's minimum capital requirements.

Bangkok Bank and its subsidiaries reported a net profit attributable to owners of the Bank for the third quarter of 2025 of Baht 13,789 million, an increase of 16.5 percent from the previous quarter, driven by a diversified revenue stream. Non-interest income increased from gains on financial instruments measured at Fair Value Through Profit or Loss (FVTPL) and gains on investments. Fees income also increased due to higher fees from securities business, as well as bancassurance and mutual fund services. Meanwhile, net interest income declined, reflecting prevailing interest rate trends and subdued loan growth amid economic headwinds. Operating expenses slightly increased attributable to continued operational efficiency enhancement. As the Bank consistently takes a prudent approach in setting aside its reserves, expected credit losses were lower in this quarter, compared to the previous quarter.

Compared with the third quarter of 2024, net profit attributable to owners of the Bank increased by 10.5 percent mainly from gains on financial instruments measured at FVTPL and gains on investments. Net interest income declined due to interest rate cuts and a slowdown in loan growth. As the Bank continues to focus on appropriate cost management, operating expenses declined compared to the same quarter last year.

For the nine months of 2025, net profit attributable to owners of the Bank was Baht 38,247 million, an increase of 9.9 percent compared to the same period last year, driven by effective asset management and a diversified revenue base amid multifaceted economic challenges. Non-interest income increased mainly from gains on financial instruments measured at FVTPL and gains on investments. Meanwhile, net interest income declined in line with interest rate trends. Operating expenses increased marginally as the Bank has continuously improved its operational efficiency alongside appropriate cost management. In addition, the Bank maintained its prudent stance by setting aside expected credit losses according to its consistent disciplined management approach.



Net Interest Income

Net interest income for the third quarter of 2025 amounted to Baht 30,750 million, declining from the previous quarter and the same period last year. For the nine months of 2025, net interest income was Baht 94,364 million, decreasing from the same period last year in line with the interest rate trends and a slowdown in loan growth amid economic headwinds. The net interest margin for the nine months of 2025 declined to 2.81 percent from a decrease in the yield on earning assets offset by the gradual reduction in funding costs.

Non-interest Income

Non-interest income for the third quarter of 2025 amounted to Baht 16,913 million, increasing from the previous quarter mainly from gains on financial instruments measured at FVTPL and gains on investments. Fees income also increased due to higher fees from securities business, as well as bancassurance and mutual fund services.

Compared with the same quarter last year, non-interest income increased from gains on financial instruments measured at FVTPL and gains on investments.

For the nine months of 2025, non-interest income was Baht 43,372 million, increased from the same period last year mainly due to gains on financial instruments measured at FVTPL and gains on investments in line with the market environment. Net fees and service income slightly declined from transaction service and mutual fund service which slowed down in the second quarter due to prevailing economic conditions.

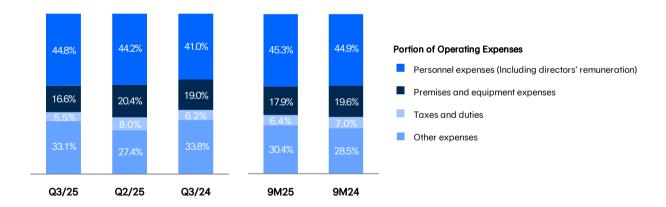


Operating Expenses

Operating expenses for the third quarter of 2025 amounted to Baht 20,697 million, increasing by 3.0 percent from the previous quarter, while decreasing by 5.2 percent from the same quarter last year. For the nine months of 2025, operating expenses amounted to Baht 61,541 million, an increase of 1.5 percent from the same period last year. This reflects the Bank has continuously improved its operational efficiency alongside appropriate cost management. As a result, the cost to income ratio for the nine months of 2025 declined to 44.7 percent.

Expected Credit Losses

For the nine months of 2025, the Bank's expected credit losses amounted to Baht 29,549 million, increasing from the same period last year. The Bank set aside expected credit losses in line with its consistent prudent approach considering the several economic challenges. These included the impact of adjustments to trade policies among major economic countries and ongoing trade negotiations, as well as domestic factors such as a slowdown in the tourism sector and political uncertainties. The Bank will continue to diligently observe and assess these factors.



Significant Items in the Financial Position

Assets

As of September 30, 2025, total assets amounted to Baht 4,538,455 million, a marginal decrease from the end of the previous quarter and a similar level to the end of last year.

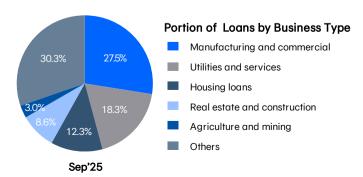

As of September 30, 2025, the Bank and its subsidiaries had loans distributed across business sectors, with 27.5 percent in the manufacturing and commercial sector, 18.3 percent in the utilities and services sector, 12.3 percent in the housing loans sector, and 8.6 percent in the real estate and construction sector.



Classified Loans and Allowance for Expected Credit Losses

As of the end of September 2025, non-performing loan (Gross NPL) totaled Baht 103,404 million. The gross NPL to total loans ratio stood at a manageable level of 3.3 percent. The allowance for expected credit losses was Baht 304,217 million. As a result, the allowance for expected credit losses to NPL ratio was at a strong level of 294.2 percent.

Investments

As of September 30, 2025, the Bank and its subsidiaries had total investments of Baht 1,217,602 million, increasing by 14.7 percent from the end of the previous quarter and 11.1 percent from the end of last year. The Bank had Baht 692,158 million in investments in Thai government and state enterprise securities, accounting for 56.8 percent of total investments. Foreign debt securities amounted to Baht 312,323 million, and net investment in equity securities amounted to Baht 99,679 million.

Debt Issued and Borrowings

Total debt issued and borrowings, as of September 30, 2025, amounted to Baht 214,196 million, a decrease of 10.7 percent from the end of June 2025 due mainly to the redemption of USD 750 million subordinated notes qualifying as Basel III-compliant Tier 1 capital in September 2025.

Shareholders' Equity

Shareholders' equity attributable to owners of the Bank, as of September 30, 2025, amounted to Baht 584,570 million, an increase of Baht 29,531 million, or 5.3 percent, from the end of 2024. This was due to the inclusion of net profit attributable to the Bank for the nine months of 2025 offset by a final dividend payment for the operating performance in 2024 of Baht 6.50 per share according to the resolution of the shareholders' meeting in April 2025, and the interim dividend payment from the operations in the first half of 2025 of 2.00 baht per share.



Sources and Utilization of Funds

As of September 30, 2025, the Bank and its subsidiaries' primary sources of funds consisted of deposits of Baht 3,174,287 million or 69.9 percent, equity attributable to owners of the Bank of Baht 584,570 million or 12.9 percent, interbank and money market items on liabilities of Baht 307,524 million or 6.8 percent, and debt issued and borrowings including financial liabilities measured at FVTPL amounting to Baht 230,878 million or 5.1 percent.

The utilization of funds comprised loans of Baht 2,606,661 million or 57.4 percent, net investments, including financial assets measured at FVTPL and net investments in associates of Baht 1,218,582 million or 26.9 percent, and net interbank and money market assets of Baht 723,486 million or 15.9 percent.

Capital Reserves and Capital Adequacy Ratio

Under the principles of Basel III, the Bank of Thailand (BOT) currently requires commercial banks registered in Thailand and members of their financial groups to maintain minimum levels of capital adequacy as measured by three ratios: the Common Equity Tier 1 capital adequacy ratio at no less than 4.50 percent, the Tier 1 capital adequacy ratio at no less than 6.00 percent, and the Total Capital Adequacy ratio at no less than 8.50 percent – measured as a percentage of total risk-weighted assets. The BOT also requires a capital conservation buffer of more than 2.50 percent. Since the Bank is classified by the BOT as a Domestic Systemically Important Bank (D-SIB), it must have an additional Common Equity Tier 1 ratio at 1.00 percent for Higher Loss Absorbency (HLA). Consequently, the Bank is required to maintain the Common Equity Tier 1 capital adequacy ratio at more than 8.00 percent, the Tier 1 capital adequacy ratio at more than 9.50 percent, and the total capital adequacy ratio at more than 12.00 percent – measured as percentages of total risk-weighted assets.

As of September 30, 2025, the Bank's Common Equity Tier 1 capital adequacy ratio was 18.01 percent, the Tier 1 capital adequacy ratio was 18.02 percent, and the total capital adequacy ratio was 22.60 percent, which was above the BOT's minimum capital requirements.
